

About 2023 Occupational Employment and Wage Estimates

Occupational Employment and Wage Estimates are calculated from data collected in a national survey of employers. Data on occupational employment and wages are collected from employers of every size, in every state, in metropolitan and nonmetropolitan areas, in all industry sectors. These estimates are cross-industry estimates; each occupation's employment and wage estimates are calculated from data collected from employers in all industry sectors. Self-employed persons are not included in the survey or estimates. The May 2023 OEWS estimates are based on the 2018 Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system and the Office of Management and Budget's [revised metropolitan area definitions](#), based on the results of the 2010 decennial census.

Wage estimates are produced in cooperation with the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

NOTE:

*Estimates for detailed occupations do not sum to the totals because the totals include occupations not shown separately. Annual wages have been calculated by multiplying the hourly mean wage by a "year-round, full-time" hours figure of 2,080 hours; for those occupations where there is not an hourly wage published, the annual wage has been directly calculated from the reported survey data. Wages for some occupations that do not generally work year-round, full time, are reported either as hourly wages or annual salaries depending on how they are typically paid.
